1.1 Coverage of Syllabus

- 34.2% reported **85-100% syllabus coverage**, while 31.9% observed **70-84%**
- Only 10.8% noted less than 30% coverage

1.2 Teachers' Preparation

- 38.0% students rated teachers' preparation as thorough, and 54.5% as satisfactory.
- A minimal 7.6% were dissatisfied (rated as indifferent or poor).

1.3 Communication Skills

- 66.4% affirmed teachers were always effective in communication.
- Very few (3.2%) felt communication was poor.

1.4 Teaching Approach

66% described the teaching approach as excellent, while 19% rated it as very good.

1.5 Fairness in Internal Evaluation

64.7% felt internal evaluation was always fair, with 21.4% considering it usually

1.6 Discussion of Assignments

66.4% stated their performance in assignments was discussed every time

1.7 Promotion of Internships and Field Visits

61.4% agreed the institution regularly promoted such opportunities

1.8 Mentoring and Cognitive Growth

51.3% acknowledged mentoring contributed to their growth very well, while 36.7% felt it contributed significantly.
